## Frank Fat Founder's Award

## Recipient for 2014



Maeley spent 20 years in the California State Legislature. She holds the unique distinction of serving in the two highest level staff positions of both houses, the Chief Administrative Officer of the California State Assembly under Speaker Willie L. Brown Jr. and the Chief of Staff to the former Senate President pro Tem David Roberti in the California State Senate.

She helped establish the first California Legislative Office of Asian Pacific Affairs which served as a liaison between the Asian Pacific American (APA) communities and the State Legislature. As the state director, she played a major role in influencing the Asian Pacific American sub-ethnic groups to strengthen their political clout by uniting as one voice to address issues that impact the entire community.
She was the co-founder of the Capitol Asian Legislative Staff Caucus, the Capitol Asian Youth Leadership Project, and the founding president of the California Asian Pacific Islander Legislative Caucus Institute. Her election as Chair of the Asian Pacific Caucus of the Calif. Democratic Party and subsequent appointment as the Chair of the National Democratic Council of Asian Pacific Americans enabled her to organize the first national convention of APA democratic leaders. This convention in 1987 marked the first time U.S. presidential candidates addressed APA issued before a national public forum.
She has been engaged in over 60 state legislative campaigns, three gubernatorial campaigns and three presidential campaigns. She served as the Deputy Political Director of the California Dukakis presidential campaign in 1988. From 1989-1997, Ms. Tom served on the executive board of the Democratic National Committee. She was a volunteer advisor to the Clinton/Gore presidential campaigns on national issues and API community outreach effort. She current serves as an API community liaison to Mayor Kevin Johnson.

Ms. Tom was selected by President Reagan to serve on his Advisory Committee on Women's Business Ownership. She was appointed by President Clinton to serve on the U.S. Delegation to the United Nations Women's World Conference in New York in 1995. In February 2003, Governor Davis appointed her to become the first Asian American to serve on the State Personnel Board which oversees the policies and merit system governing over 200,000 State employees. From 2006-2008, she served as the State Personnel Board's representative on the CalPERS board which oversees the nation's largest pension fund. She has also advised the California State Controller John Chiang on pensions and investments and she is the founding co-chair of the Assn. of Asian American Investment Managers.

## Introduction to <br> The Frank Fat Founder's Award

CACS Congratulates Maeley Tom as the 2014 Frank Fat Founder's Award Recipient. This year's celebration will be held at the Happy Garden on Friday, October 3, 2014 at 5:30 to 8:30 pm.

Named for the late Frank Fat (1904-1997),
(the driving force that created the Chinese American Council of
 Sacramento in 1988), CACS past president Dr. Sonney Chong and the CACS Board established the Frank Fat Founder's Award in 1997. The intent of the Award was to acknowledge those leaders who had, for years, selflessly given of themselves and their time for the community.
The Frank Fat Founder's Award is the highest award given by CACS. Only one worthy individual receives this award each year, and the presentation is held at the annual CACS Gold Mountain Celebration.
Candidates for the Frank Fat Founders Award must be a member/organization of the Sacramento community in good standing and have qualities exemplifying the founding spirit of CACS, which include:
2o Being a strong, positive role model for youth, demonstrating good citizenship and patriotism.
\& Being a strong representative of the Asian Pacific Islander (API) community to the Greater Sacramento community.
a Display a pattern of unselfish behavior which place the well-being of the API community before personal feelings.
\& Has performed outstanding service to the API community for an extended period of time.
Individuals nominated for the Frank Fat Founders Award must have demonstrated a high level of leadership, involvement, and commitment to the API community and its organizations and projects for an extended period of time; to have had extensive involvement with one or more of the following:
\& Programs/projects preserving the culture and history of the APIs.
$\infty$ Advocate for civil right issues beneficial to the rights and well-being of APIs, both locally and abroad.
) Humanitarian accomplishments benefiting the API Community.
\& Constructive activities that raise the awareness of the community toward APIs.

## 2014 Hall of Fame Jimmie R. Yee

Iimmie Yee was elected to the Sacramento County Board of Supervisors in June 2006 and sworn into office on January 9, 2007 representing the Second District. He was reelected in June 2010 for a second term. Jimmie is a native of Sacramento. He attended local public schools prior to graduating from the University of California, Berkeley with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Civil Engineering. After beginning his career with the State of California in 1956, he started his own consulting structural engineering firm in 1966. During his 25 years of ownership, his firm grew to one of the largest consulting structural engineering firms in the Sacramento Valley. His company designed many of Sacramento's landmark buildings including the Sacramento Convention Center, Capitol Bank, Riverview Plaza and Sutter General Hospital. He is licensed as a Civil and Structural Engineer in California, and previously held licenses in Nevada, Oregon and Washington as well. He is a Fellow in the American Society of Civil Engineers and the Structural Engineers Association of California. In 1992, Jimmie was elected to a four-year term on the Sacramento City Council representing Council District Four. He was re-elected in 1996 and in 2000. On December 14, 1999, Councilmember Jimmie Yee was unanimously selected as Mayor by the Sacramento City Council to fulfill the remainder of the term of the late Mayor Serna for the year 2000. Over the years, Jimmie has been active with many organizations and causes throughout the Sacramento community. He organized the first Asian bone marrow drive in the United States in 1989, registering more than 2,500 people in that effort. He is a member of the Sacramento Optimist Club, Sacramento Asian Sports Foundation, and the Chinese American Council of Sacramento. Jimmie has been married to his wife, Mary for 60 years. They have six children, all college graduates and married, and are the proud grandparents of 17 grandchildren. CACS is proud to induct Jimmie R.Yee into CACS Hall of Fame

CELEBRATING

1939 marked the beginning of World War II, the creation of Superman, the start of Little League, the college craze of goldfish swallowing, the first televised college football game, and the opening of Frank's 806 - the original Frank Fat's - at 806 L Street in Sacramento.

In 1939, as we were emerging from the Great Depression, the verage cost of a new house was $\$ 3800$, average wages per year were $\$ 1730$ a gallon of gasoline was ten cents, and a new car cost $\$ 700$. And food was cheap. a loaf of bread was eight cents, ound of harburger was fourteen cents, and a fill diner a pound of hamburger was for
Frank Fat's cost just 85 cents.


Back in 1939, when Frank Fat opened his namesake restaurant, penniless immigrant dishwasher penniless immigrant dishwasher
from Canton, China, would soon pack his 806 L Street location with governors, U. S. senators and representatives, along with lobbyists, state stakeholders and legislators from both sides of the aisle. The rich and powerful came, and so did all of Sacramento and beyond. Fat's became legendary as California's "Third House" where landmark bills were drafted in back booths, and tort reform arose out of a famous "napkin deal"

Frank always had a genuine interest in
people and their well-being which transcended race, age, and language barriers. Above all, his cheerful persona transcended parproviding the salsan politics. Frank Fat's takes pride in made Frank, Wing, and Weyland so popular with customers, greeting each patron with a warm handshake and friendly smile. Today, Kevin, a third generation Fat, continues this tradition of excellent and personalized service.
