Tribute to Philip Choy 1926-2017

Phil Choy was a renowned Chinese historian, architect, teacher, illustrious mentor, family man and a dear friend to many. My husband Doug and I had the pleasure of working with Phil and Sarah on the Sacramento federal courthouse and our book, "Canton Footprints" for over 10 years. His passing was celebrated on Treasure Island, San Francisco on Sunday, April 23, 2017 with over 500 guests. Honey Lum, Elizabeth Yep and I were able to attend the loving memorial celebration of this extraordinary man.

This was a man who had a wicked sense of humor, was wise and compassionate, thoroughly passionate about factual research on Chinese history, and generous to a fault, donating time and money to numerous community and national organizations dear to his heart. He spearheaded the Asian studies program at SF State , and the Chinese Historical Society of America museum project as well as participating in the Angel Island Immigration Station preservation events. His time in the Army provided him a glimpse of racial injustice that aroused his activism for civil rights.

Learn what you can to build the next move.


Make California, land of leaders,
